VOCABULARY Culture

Outlook 2 presents a carefully selected vocabulary syllabus aligned to B1 / B2. The vocabulary is presented in context, as well as practised in exercises.

In this unit, the topic vocabulary is related to culture.

Outlook 2 Interactive Student (IS) offers helpful online material that students can use to prepare before the lesson. This advance preparation will encourage more productive classroom participation, since students will come to class able to use the subject material more effectively. This material includes a wordlist with translations as well as audio of the vocabulary that they are going to learn in this section.

Outlook 2 Interactive Classroom (IC) offers an interactive classroom presentation for each vocabulary lesson. You may also want to use this wordlist with translations before starting this vocabulary lesson to check your students' familiarity with the vocabulary items that they are going to study.

Remind students that there is a full glossary at the back of the Student's Book on pages 108-116.

Tell students to read the posts in the blog about British and American cultures and ask them which comments are written by British people and which by Americans. Remind students to pay attention to the words in colour.

ANSWERS

SusX and RockyR are American. KayRem89, JenTy and MissBB are British.

OPTIONAL ACTIVITY: READING COMPREHENSION

For stronger classes, you may want to ask the following questions to check students' understanding of the blog in Exercise 1.

- 1 What does SusX not like about Brits?
- 2 Why does KayRem89 not like American humour?
- 3 Why does MissBB say that Americans value individualism?
- 4 In what way are table manners different in the United States to those in the UK?

ANSWERS

- 1 Brits are never direct or say what they really mean.
- 2 Because it is often silly.
- 3 Because the United States was founded by pioneers who travelled there looking for freedom.
- 4 Brits keep their knife and fork in their hands while eating. Americans put down the knife after cutting their food and then switch the fork to their right hand to eat their food.
